## SCALES PAIR TAKES SECOND

Low Net Honors Go To Dr. Clark And Son With 67

Roland MacKenzie and son Clark returned the Maryland State Father and Son golf title to Baltimore yesterday, when they put together a two-under-par 70 over their home Green Spring Valley course, to lead one of the biggest fields in the 25-year history of the event.

MacKenzie, a former Walker Cupper, and his son, a member of the University of Virginia varsity golf team, carded two bogies and two birdies on the outgoing nine, playing on the selective drive-alternate shot basis.

**3 Birdies Coming In**  
Coming in they picked up three birdies and one bogie to finish two-under. Clark got the birdies on the front side and Roland picked up those on the inbound journey.

They were three under coming to the eighteenth and father missed a 5 footer there that gave them their only bogie for that side. The MacKenzies won this same title in 1959 but lost out to the McFerris of Manor last year. The McFerris did not play yesterday.

**Scales Take Second**  
Second place went to the Scales, Ken and son Ronnie, the latter a University of Maryland junior, with a 74.

Tied for the third place at 77 were the Mosers, Max and Max, Jr. and John and Richard Burt of Turf Valley. Also Cal Hargis and son Phil of Westbriar; Bill and Bill Briggs, Jr. of Columbia and Wally and Jimmy Engle of Hillendale.

Dr. Oscar Camp and son Mike, of Turf Valley, took the top low net prize with an 81-14-67.

## MACKENZIE TOPS AMATEUR CHAMP

MacKenzie Wins By 1 Up In Amateur Finals

Clark MacKenzie returned the Maryland State Amateur golf championship to Baltimore for the first time in eight years yesterday at Elkridge, beating Ralph Bogart, of Chevy Chase, 1 up, in the 36-hole final.

It was a most popular victory for the majority of the 75 fans who followed the 25-year-old MacKenzie over his home course and a bitter disappointment for Bogart, who at 46, was seeking his tenth title at 1948.

Unquestionably, the match was one of the most exciting and best played finales in Maryland State Golf Association history and was in doubt until MacKenzie dropped a clinching 7-foot birdie putt on the last hole.

**2 Under-Par 69s**  
The four-time Elkridge club champion carded a pair of one-under-par 69s and Bogart's rounds for the day were 69-70.

Bogart was three up after eight holes in the morning and they went to lunch even. MacKenzie was three up with five to play in the afternoon and nearly lost the lead.

After the match, it was difficult to see who was more pleased with the championship, young Clark, who has never won a tournament of consequence, or his father, Roland, who was a Walker Cup star. The best the younger MacKenzie has done in this tournament was a loss in the quarter-finals at Congressional in 1960.

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**Long Putt On 12th**  
After halving the next two, MacKenzie's long putt on the twelfth cut the margin to one, and a 12-foot chip for a birdie on the fourteenth to even the match. Bogart birdied the fifteenth, but MacKenzie got that back with a birdie of his own at the sixteenth.

They halved the last two with Bogart posting a 34 for the back nine and MacKenzie a 32 for his 60.

Bogart grabbed the lead again on the first hole in the afternoon as MacKenzie missed his drive, took three to get on the green and two-putted. The next two were halved, but Bogart had to come out of a trap on the third hole to get his par five and that was his first trap set in seven rounds.

MacKenzie parred the fourth to even the match and dropped a 4-foot birdie putt on the fifth to go 1 up. It was all even again at the seventh, however, as Bogart put in a 3-footer for a birdie, but he lost the eighth to a par and MacKenzie was in front to stay.

The 12-footer on No. 12 gave MacKenzie a working margin, and he went 3 up when Bogart three-putted for bogey on the thirteenth. Bogart, who left putts inches short all day, finally ceded a birdie hole for the longer hitting putt, with a precocious lead of one.

The two teams at 68 were led by Harry Parr and Ramon Sota. Parr, who is a member of the Baltimore Country Club, and Sota, who is a member of the Green Spring Valley Hunt Club, were the only two teams to score a 68.

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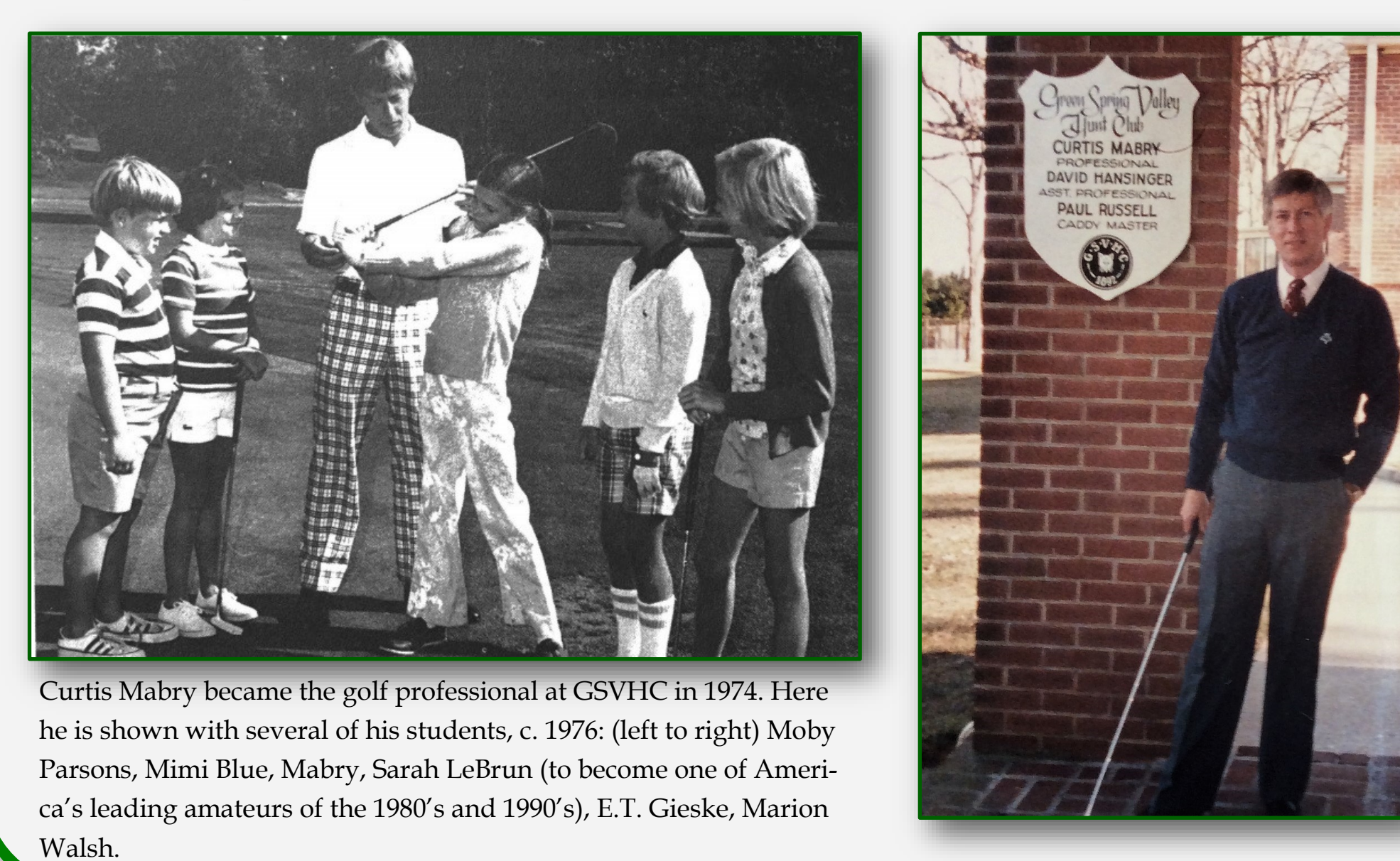
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## CURTIS MABRY HIRED AS HEAD GOLF PROFESSIONAL

Curtis Mabry became Head Golf Professional in 1974, but the truth is he grew up at Green Spring. In 1957 at age 12, he began caddying at Green Spring. In 1968 under the careful nurturing of John Flattery, Curtis became the assistant pro. Upon Flattery's retirement, he was quickly named Head Golf Professional.

Mabry's knowledge and gentlemanly courtesy sets him apart from his peers. His patience with younger golfers, and his constructive encouragement of the club's junior program was an enormous asset to the "family" ambience the Club shares. Roland MacKenzie made his first start in the Maryland State Golf Association's seniors championship a successful one yesterday at the Elkridge Club.

MacKenzie, an Elkridge member, covered the 6,237-yard, par-72 layout in 38-37-72. This was good for a comfortable three-stroke cushion on runner-up Lynn Johnson of Argyle, 41-35-76.

Both were in the 55-59-year-old bracket.

George Campbell, an early finisher, put 40-40-71 on the board, then stood back to see how long it would stand. His round began on an auspicious note when he captured the 370-yard first hole. He bagged a four-iron 160 yards into the cup.

He was the 5th member of the Middle Atlantic PGA. He worked tirelessly over a period of 22 years serving the organization in many roles—President, V. President, and Secretary-Treasurer. He hosted the MAPGA Match Play Championship (Baltimore City Open) at GSVHC from 1946-1965. In 2011, John was elected to the Middle Atlantic PGA Hall of Fame.

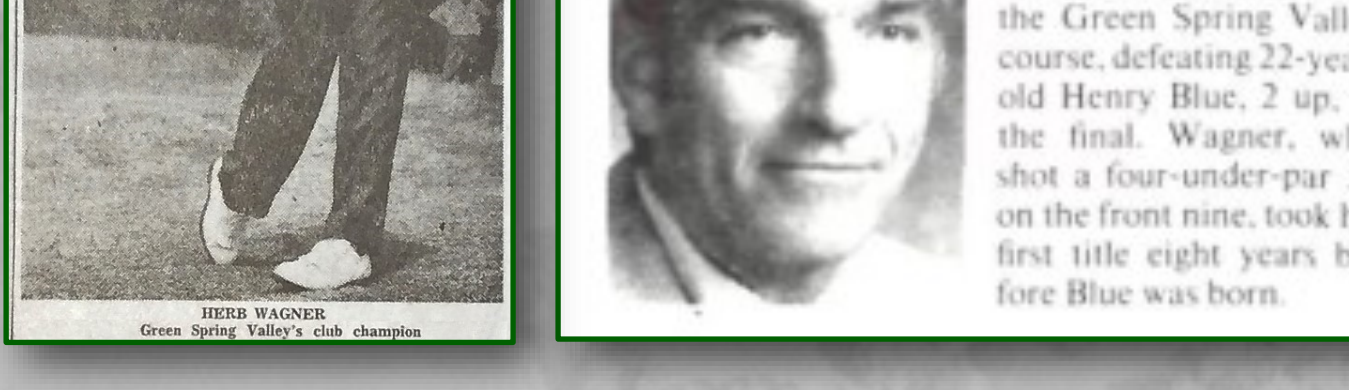
