MacKenzie, a former Walker Cupper, and his son, a member of the University of Virginia varsity golf team, carded two bogies and two birdies on the outgoing nine, playing on the selective drive-alternate shot basis.




MacKenzies In Spotlight At Norbeck Tomorrow





significantly, his ardent support of our members, young and old alike. John's reputation among his peers quickly set the standard for all the club professionals in the area. John had a rich and prominent golf career preceding




